

WRITING DEVELOPMENT

Making notes is a skilled task, develops over years, and everyone has their own variant! The exercises in this unit are a brief intro. The best way to learn this skill, however, is to do it; every page you study should be read with a pencil and notebook by your side. PS research has shown the hand-WRITING the notes ‘fixes’ the information in your brain better than typing or highlighting.

9. Making Notes III – sentence-level practice

In exercises 5 & 8 (Treaty of Versailles) we looked at the techniques of turning prose into notes. This exercise asks you put those techniques into practice.

The webpage has six paragraphs of text.

The first reads:

“The League of Nations was set up because President Wilson wanted this more than anything else.”

How might you make a note of this sentence. The website notes have it:

“Set up ∴ Wilson wanted it most.”

“He wanted the League to be a kind of ‘world parliament’, where nations would sort out their arguments. He hoped this would stop wars. .”
